Smoking and Smaller Workplaces



Christine Kava recently completed her PhD in Community and Behavioral Health at the UI College of Public Health. Her dissertation examined smoking behaviors and outcomes at smaller workplaces in Iowa. As part of this research, she interviewed 32 Business Leadership Network members about the smoking policies and programs at their workplace. The findings from this study show that:

- The smallest workplaces (less than 20 employees) offer less protection against smoking.
- Workplace characteristics, such as how supportive workplaces are of healthy behaviors, can affect employee smoking.

Ul report provides recommendations for prescription opioid, heroin epidemic in Iowa

A new report from the University of Iowa includes several policy and program recommendations to address the state's opioid crisis after a review process involving dozens of stakeholders from across the state.

<u>UI working with Michael J. Fox Foundation on potentially game-changing Parkinson's</u> study

The UI College of Public Health's Clinical Trials Statistical Data Management Center will collect and analyze data for a follow-up study testing whether a drug approved to treat cancer can be repurposed for Parkinson's patients, potentially slowing the disease's progression or even reversing its effects.

Enhancing lowa's flexibility to reform health insurance markets

Brad Wright, CPH assistant professor of health management and policy, recently co-authored an opinion piece stating that now is the time for lowa to craft a new state innovation waiver for the individual insurance market and ease the concerns that derailed the stopgap measure last fall.

Researchers examine role of paid family leave in reducing nursing home use

A new study from the University of Iowa and Syracuse University suggests that a more inclusive paid family leave policy could be effective in reducing nursing home use among older adults.

Study shows firework injuries more than doubled after new law in effect

A review by the University of Iowa Hospitals and Clinics (UIHC) Department of Emergency Medicine, UI Injury Prevention Research Center and the UIHC Department of Surgery, shows a big increase in the number and severity of injuries from fireworks during the first legal period for their purchase this past June and July.

UI to study HPV vaccine disparities in rural areas

UI investigators are beginning a yearlong study to better understand why HPV (human papillom avirus) vaccine coverage in rural areas of the state lags behind other adolescent immunizations. "This vaccine is nearly 100 percent effective at preventing cancer, so we want to make sure that all adolescents in lowa have the opportunity to benefit from this vaccine when they are getting their other adolescent vaccines," says Natoshia Askelson, CPH assistant professor of community and behavioral health.

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
